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how the nsf became an important yet controversial patron for the social sciences influencing debates over their scientific status and social relevance in the early cold war years the u s government established the national science foundation nsf a civilian agency that soon became widely known for its dedication to supporting first

rate science the agency s 1950 enabling legislation made no mention of the social sciences although it included a vague reference to other sciences nevertheless as mark solovey shows in this book the nsf also soon became a major albeit controversial source of public funding for them
